

Plenary I - Quality assurance of transnational higher education



Achim Hopbach

Achim Hopbach is an international higher education consultant with 25 years of experience in higher education reform and quality assurance. He specialises in cross-border higher education, joint programmes, quality assurance policies and legislation, and higher education reform; he is also involved in international reviews of higher education institutions and quality assurance agencies. Before setting up his own business he served as the director of national quality assurance agencies in Austria and Germany. Achim Hopbach held and holds various positions in boards and advisory bodies of quality assurance agencies in Europe, Hong Kong, and Dubai; and as President of ENQA.



Simon Roy

Simon Roy is a lead analyst in the Higher Education Policy Team in the OECD's Directorate of Education and Skills. Since joining the OECD in 2017, he has worked on a wide range of higher education policy issues, including quality assurance, workforce alignment and doctoral education. He is currently coordinator of the Resourcing Higher Education Project, which explores how OECD jurisdictions structure and fund institutional networks, support students financially and regulate employment of academic staff. In this project, he has led system-specific work with Denmark, Finland, the Flemish Community of Belgium, Ireland, Israel, Lithuania, and Portugal. Before joining the OECD, Simon was a policy officer in the unit responsible for higher education at the European Commission.

Plenary 2 - Global perspectives on quality assurance



Mohammad Shatar bin Sabran

Professor Dato' Dr. Mohammad Shatar Sabran was appointed as the Chief Executive Officer of the Malaysian Qualifications Agency (MQA) in February 2021. As an Agency under the Ministry of Higher Education, MQA is the sole body that oversees and coordinates the quality assurance and accreditation of national higher education. Under this appointment, he is also the President of ASEAN Quality Assurance Network (AQAN) with a total of 21 members across the ASEAN region.

In 1999, he completed his doctorate in Leadership and Community Development from University of Missouri, Colombia USA. His early career in education management started in Universiti Putra Malaysia when he was appointed as the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Student Affairs and Alumni) in 2013. He was later appointed as Vice Chancellor of Universiti Pendidikan Sultan Idris in 2017.





Lamine Gueye is full professor of physiology. He held various university positions: Dean of the faculty of medicine of Gaston Berger University (UGB) Vice chancellor of UGB, and Vice chancellor of Alioune Diop University of Bambey. Since July 2019 he is the Executive Secretary of the National Authority of Quality assurance in Higher Education, Research and Innovation in Senegal (ANAQ-Sup). He is also President of RAFANAQ (Réseau africain francophone d'assurance qualité) and Vice-president of AfriQAN (the African Quality Assurance Network).

Badar Alkindi has 22 years of experience in higher education and quality assurance. He currently serves as the diplomat at the Secretariat General of the Gulf Cooperation Council for the Arab States of the Gulf (GCC) and Director of the Gulf Network for Quality Assurance of Higher Education in the GCC Arab States (GNQAHE) since 2020.

He is the former board member and representative of the Sultanate of Oman in the board of GNQAHE (2017-2020) and worked for 20 years for the Ministry of Higher Education (Oman) as Deputy Director General of Private Higher Education Institutions and Director of Qualifications Assessment Department. He is a PhD candidate in the field of Higher Education Accreditation.

Esther Huertas

Esther Huertas is the Head of the Quality Assurance Department at AQU Catalunya, the Catalan University Quality Assurance Agency, since 2020. She is working in the field of QA of higher education more than 16 years. Previously, she served as a researcher at the University of Barcelona and followed her professional activity as an assistant professor at the same university. She holds a Ph.D. in Chemical Engineering from the University of Barcelona.

She was the chair of ENQA's working group on quality assurance and e-learning and the work package leader of quality assurance in online higher education in TeSLA project – Trust-based authentication & authorship e-assessment analysis.





Karena Maguire is the head of Partnerships Division at QQI. She has over 25 years of experience in agency quality assurance initiatives in evaluation (national, thematic and institutional), in review (agency, institutional, programme and research) in both regulatory and quality enhancement contexts, and in national policy development (including the QQI suite of Core statutory QA Guidelines for all providers, and aligned to the ESG). Karena works with large public HE providers, independent private HE providers and further (vocational) education providers. She established the National Professional Accreditation Body Network hosted by QQI and the National Academic Integrity Network (NAIN).

Aurelija Valeikienė works as Deputy Director at the Centre for Quality Assessment in Higher Education (SKVC), Lithuania since 2004. Her areas of expertise include external quality assurance of higher education, academic recognition of foreign qualifications, and internationalisation. In the past, she was elected President of CEENQA and was member of ENQA Board, also contributed to a number of ENQA working groups. Aurelija was Lithuanian delegate to the pan-European working group on structural reforms at the Bologna Secretariat.

Currently she is involved in the Bologna Process peer support group on academic recognition (including automatic recognition of qualifications) and micro-credentials; for ENQA she serves on the Agency Review Committee and works as expert in external quality assurance agency reviews. Aurelija has worked as an expert locally and internationally for the Council of Europe, the World Bank, European Commission, European Training Foundation, EuropeAsia Foundation etc.

Doris Herrmann

Doris Herrmann is Managing Director of the German accreditation agency AQAS for 15 years and works in the area of quality assurance of Higher Education for 27 years. Her professional work experience covers a wide range of issues in QA. She coordinated more than 200 assessment procedures of programmes in Higher Education in Germany. The accreditation of Joint Programmes is one of her specific areas of knowledge and therefore she was member of an expert group of the German Accreditation Council (GAC). Her other areas of expertise and experiences are: Member of the Board of ENQA (before that member of Review Committee); International programme accreditation procedures and as well as QA-projects in Indonesia, Egypt, Kenya, Ghana, Nigeria, Rwanda, Lesotho, Turkey, Moldova, Sultanate of Oman, China; consultant in EU-projects for reorganisation/implementation of accreditation agencies in Egypt and Moldova; ENQA-Reviewer in procedures in Ireland, Serbia, Great Britain; Reviewer in accreditation procedures for QQI (Ireland) and HAQAA (African Initiative).





Patrick Van den Bosch is head of VLUHR QA, which is the Quality Assurance Agency of the Flemish Higher Education Council, based in Brussels.
